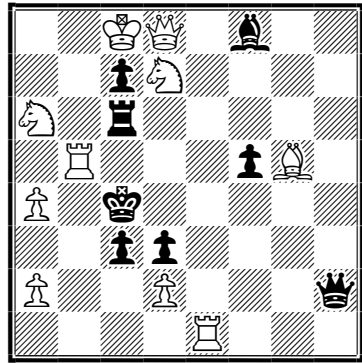

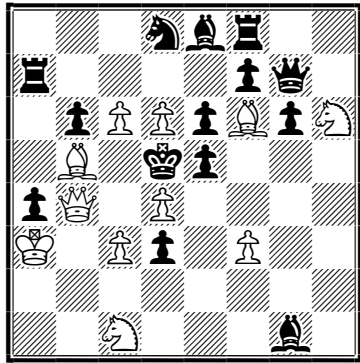

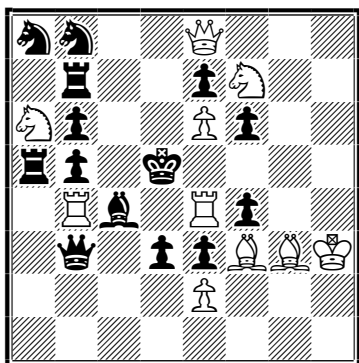

I think even with some weaknesses the problem shows a very strong thematic content in a good form.
