Opening address, act of remembrance for deceased problemists After some initial words by the representatives of the Hungarian Chess Federation, who welcomed all participants, President Dr Wenda expressed his thanks for the invitation and declared the meeting open.

He regretted the death of several well known and meritorious problemists since the XXX.meeting. A minute of mourning and remembrance was held for:

§ 2 Verification of attendance and voting rights

21 member countries were represented (see also § 4.1.) and 3 were absent (Czechoslovakia, GDR and Rumania).

The meeting was declared legal. P.A. Petkov the new delegate of Bulgaria replacing Ing Rangelov, who had retired after more than 20 years' activity, was welcomed.

§ 3 Approval of the Graz minutes 1987

Annex to these minutes:

Ing Jaroslav BRADA was an observer but not an official delegate of Czechoslovakia (see letter of 8.2.1988). This had no decisive influence on the voting in Graz.

§ 4 Application of new members

4.1. On the first day the application of Mongolia as the 25th

PCCC member was accepted by unanimous decision, and President Dr Wenda welcomed Sonomun CHIMEDTZEREN as delegate of this country. Accordingly 22 members were present.

4.2. Establishing of the Israel Chess Composition Association U. Avner reported the reasons for establishing this Association (see letter of 8.11.1987). In accordance with § I.1. of the PCCC Statutes the commission raised no objections, because it seemed obvious that the Israeli Chess Federation had accepted the new Association, which can be compared with similar Problem Associations in other countries (FRG, Great Britain, Netherlands).

§ 6 Notification of proposals

The following proposals were notified:

- Proposal by Poland, to organize every year an individual world championship in chess composition.
- Proposal by Netherlands, to speed up the modifications of the Album-selection procedure.

§ 7 Codex:

Drs C. Goldschmeding gave a short report. The subcommittee could not settle all the critical points but it would be ready to continue the matter by correspondence during the next months. A written proposal will be sent to the President before the next meeting.

§ 8 Competitions

8.1. The 12th World Chess Solving Championship (WCSC)
12 teams (42 solvers) took part. L. Anyos acted as tour-

nament director and chief judge, assisted by G. Füsing, Ing N. Dimitrov, Z. Laborczi.

Dr Axt proposed to extend point 9.5. of the rules for the WCSC by adding the sentence: "In a round with an insoluble problem 0 minutes are awarded for all solvers".

This was accepted by unanimous decision.

Finally the WCSC subcommittee made the following recommendations:

- a) Do not use keys without any relation to the character of a chess problem.
 - b) Use only unpublished problems.
 - c) Instruct judges to act exactly according to the rules.

8.2. Official results of the 3rd WCCT

The President announced officially the first three places and presented prizes to the delegates of the respective countries.

1st Prize USSR

2nd Prize Poland

3rd Prize Yugoslavia

The complete award will appear when an open question in the moremover section has been solved. Judge R. Kofman will send his final award by the end of September to B. Ellinghoven. If he should be unable to do it, Dr Wenda was empowered by a commission decision to finish the work instead of Mr Kofman.

8.3. 4th WCCT, selection of the themes, announcement.

Dr J. Rusinek submitted the proposal to nominate the Polish Chess Federation as organizer. E. Iwanow would be the responsible contact person in Foland.

The selected judges and themes were announced by B. Ellinghoven, who promised to give technical support by printing the announcement, the entries and the results, if the commission agrees.

Among the judges three were selected who had not the title International Judge of the FIDE. They were requested to apply for this title in Bournemouth. B. Ellinghoven promised that the written announcement would follow by the end of October 1988. The closing date for the entries will be February 15th 1990. The English text will be official. The subcommittee for computer matters was requested to submit addresses of persons ready and able to test the soundness of the problems. Dr Rusinek indicated the possibility of checking direct mate problems from 2 to 6 moves in Poland.

Finally Dr Wenda proposed that a single vote be taken to cover all the 5 points under consideration: themes, judges, organizer, technical assistant, computer checking.

The proposals were accepted by unanimous decision of the members present (Dr G. Nadareishvili (USSR), S. Chimedtzeren (Mongolia), and A. Arguelles (Spain) were absent). Dr Wenda expressed his thanks for the excellent work of the WCCT subcommittee.

8.4. FIDE-Album tourney 1980-82, final report by the President
The President said official words of thanks in the name
of the PCCC to the responsible persons, especially to Mr
Petrovic and Mr Condic for the enormous amount of work.
The new Album fulfils all requirements and will be an
example for future issues (solutions opposite to the
problems, theme register). K. Widlert as speaker of the
subcommittee added that this Album would be much better
than all the former Albums. He mentioned the problem of
late judgements and expressed his hope for a shorter
printing process next time. For the next Album he will
distribute detailed instructions and uniform diagram
sheets to the section directors.

8.5. FIDE-Album tourney 1983-85, preliminary report by the section directors

The Album was distributed by the publisher Mr Condic during the meeting (more than 100 free copies for delegates, judges and directors).

The approximate number of the entries was announced for all sections:

2# approx. 2060 3# -"-1120 n# 600 900 c# 470 1470 fairies-"-790 retros -"-110 Total -"-7520 On the average there is a good progress in all sections. But a delay must be expected in the 2# section, as the problems, sent by post to the judge Mr Melnichenko, are lost on the way from the Netherlands to the USSR. Section director C. Goldschmeding will send new copies to the judge.

8.6. Album register, printing of future albums

Firstly the Dutch proposal (see § 6) was discussed thoroughly. Many advantages and disadvantages were found in the discussion. The matter seemed to be not fully developed for a decision so it was postponed to the Bournemouth meeting 1989. The subcommittee was requested to make proposals there. In Bournemouth also the judges and directors for the Album 1986-88 should be selected. K. Widlert informed the commission that DI. N. Petrovic will not be once more at the commission's disposal as editor. M. Kovacevic expressed the intention to lock for a new responsible person in Yugoslavia and promised to prepare this point for the next meeting. The questions as to treat corrections and new versions of problems and problems with unclear sources was not discussed thoroughly.

Finally J. Hannelius recommended seeking a balanced selection between the different Album sections in future. The subcommittee should analyse the Albums 1980-82 and 1983-85 in this direction. The matter was postponed to next year.

8.7. Olympic composing tourneys

Prof B. Zappas will give a report before the next meeting. An open Olympic composing tourney was announced by M. Kovacevic. The sections are twomovers, three movers, (judge M. Velimirovic), helpmates (judge F. Abdurahmanovic), selfmates (judge Z. Janevski). Entries will be accepted till October 1st 1989 and the awards will appear at the beginning of 1990.

§ 9 Publications

The commission accepted the report by the subcommittee and the centre for errata lists, informing the members that 15 books have been tested.

§ 11 Statutes

11.1.Notification of the amended version (Budapest 1988)

An editorial committee consisting of Dr Wenda and C. Russ introduced the new versions in German and English. It will be printed by B. Ellinghoven for distribution to all members.

11.2.Notification of the amended WCSC rules (Graz 1987)

Point 9.5 was amended according to the proposal of Mr Axt (see § 8.1).

Both notifications were accepted (21 votes in favour, one abstention).

§ 12 Establishing of new titles for problem composers

a) FIDE-Master

A written proposal by Yugoslavia submitted during the meeting will be included in the Agenda for Bournemouth. Dr Wenda suggested waiting for the results of the 1983-85 Album, in order to have a better idea about the actual number of candidates for such a title.

b) Proposal by Poland (see § 6)

Dr H. Axt mentioned the various competitions already existing and had doubts about the general appeal of the proposal to German composers (bad experiences with "Schwalbe Pokal") M. Bonavoglia and Drs C. Goldschmeding criticized the plan that only one problem of one composer in each group would be provided.

Dr Wenda added that the selected problem would usually be one of an established master-composer, so this system would not be suitable to encourage young problemists. He raised then the questions of costs, judges, organizers and so on. Dr Rusinek will prepare a modified proposal for the Bournemouth meeting.

§ 13 Contacts with big FIDE (report by the President)

The grant of sFr 3000,- for the period August 1987-July 1988 has been paid.

Dr Wenda reported about an alteration in the General Secretariat. Dr Lim Kok Ann has retired. A new Secretary will be nominated before the end of the year. For the present Assistant Secretary Mr Abundo is discharging the function.

Prof B. Zappas proposed getting official documents for titles from the big FIDE. Dr Wenda answered that such a document would be available for each problemist who is ready to pay sFr 100,-to big FIDE. He promised to explore the possibilities of printing specific PCCC documents with tolerable costs.

§ 14 Future meetings and future WCSC

14.1.Invitation 1989 by Britain

C. Russ gave a short report. The meeting will take place from 19th-26th August 1989 in Bournemouth.

14.2.Invitation 1990

A. Arguelles offered Benidorm near Alicante in September. He mentioned that since 1965 there had been no meeting in Spain, and emphasized facilities and the influence of the organizer Mr Munoz in Benidorm.

Mr Munoz promised to give complete information about Benidorm in Bournemouth. The hotel would be 5 km from Benidorm and would offer good conditions.

M. Kovacevic stated that he could not see a real chance to combine the PCCC meeting with the Chess Olympiad in Yugos-lavia. There were no other applications. Dr Wenda proposed a vote on the Spanish invitation. The result was the acceptance of Benidorm for 1990 by unanimous decision of the members present (Dr G. Nadareishvili, S. Chimedtzeren and U. Avner were absent).

§ 15 Study composition match USSR-rest of the world

L. Falk (Sweden) gave a short report underlining the importance of propagating studies.

By the end of September 1988 all countries will receive an official invitation. A composer may contribute one study under each of two themes.

§ 16 Any other business

Dr G. Nadareishvili proposed the establishment of a subcommittee for studies with the following aims and tasks:

- 1. Promoting closer contacts with chess-players
- 2. Methodical recommendations in a handbook
- 3. Links with computer chess
 - 4. Announcing lists of defective studies
- 5. Recommendations to the PCCC
 - Plan of action setting up special matches, tourneys and meetings
 - 7. Register of all study tourneys

The proposal was supported by the study composers O. Comay, L. Falk, A. Hildebrand, Dr. G. Nadareishvili, V. Neidse, P. Perkonoja, J. Van Reek, J. Roycroft, Dr J. Rusinek, P. Valois. Dr H. Axt found these aims to be too general and pointed at all the other types of problems having no specific subcommittees. After a longer discussion Dr Wenda requested a vote.

The <u>Subcommittee for Studies</u> was accepted as a standing subcommittee (§ IX of the Statutes) by a majority (12 votes in favour, 2 votes against, 4 abstentions). U. Avner, M. Bonavoglia, S. Chimedtzeren and Dr N. Guttman were absent.

After this the following were elected as members of this subcommittee (17 votes in favour, 1 abstention):
