Foreword

The results of the World Championship in Chess Composition for Individuals for the years 2004-2006 are a testimony to the interest which this competition arouses among the large community of composers all over the world. We need, however, to remember that a notable number of other well known composers refrain from taking part in the competition. These composers believe that the notion of "World Champion" in any given genre is out of harmony with our art, in the same way as it might be in any other art form. The dispute about this question will certainly continue.

The competition began with some hesitation. There was a major delay in sending the problems to the judges according to the set timetable and the director, Zvonimir Hernitz, seemed unreachable. A special effort on the part of the undersigned was needed in order to get in touch with the director over the phone and then by emails. The involvement of the other Presidium members was required as well, and it was after Marko Klasinc travelled to Zagreb for a personal meeting with Dr Hernitz that things started to stabilise and then move ahead at an accelerated pace.

With the help of Hannu Harkola, a list of participants and their entries appeared on the PCCC website. Thereafter, the problems were sent to the judges, who did an excellent job in providing their judgments within a much tighter schedule than planned. Dr Hernitz then dealt with the processing of judgments and the summarising of results.

The reasons for the delay seem to relate to personal difficulties, some of them health issues which improved over time. Today we can thank Dr Hernitz for his dedicated work, carried out despite adverse personal conditions, and we also thank all those people who helped to bring the competition to a successful conclusion.

My congratulations to the winners, many of whom received their medals at the closing ceremony of the Jurmala PCCC congress. I am certain that readers will find great pleasure in studying this booklet, as it is packed with compositions of the highest level.

Introduction

The World Championship in Composing Individual of the FIDE (WCCI) 2004-2008 is completed. 224 participants from 35 countries participated in the tournament, with 2319 compositions in 8 sections. Whole weight of all shipments was 40 kg. Three judges were in every section. Judges informed director about cooks, duals, anticipation and he informed other judges. The discrepancies between marks for same problem were not large. The decision of the organization was in Wageningen, 2006 (49th WCCC). Problems had to be sent till Jul. 31, 2007. Shipments were sent on time but from some countries arrived after 40-50 days. Entries were very different. Many problems are high quality, but there were numerous entries of low value. The question is how to organise the WCCI in the future, because the overlap with the FIDE Album. Entries of the WCCI are given marks in primary tourney, then in WCCI, and finally in FIDE Album.

During the WCCI I had some personal and other difficulties. Mr. Dusko Tadic, president of the Croatian Chess Problemist's Association and Branko Koludrovic helped me.

I would like to acknowledge Mr. Uri Avner, president of the PCCC-FIDE, Marko Klasinc and Hannu Harkola, vice presidents, for help, understanding and very useful advice. Many thanks to the judges for their hard work and help in concluding the WCCI.
