





I think even with some weaknesses the problem shows a very strong thematic content in a good form.







little heavy position and somewhat poor white rooks stopped this problem from climbing a little higher. Nevertheless, a very nice achievement!





Unfortunately a lot of white pieces play a role only in of the thematic variations, which makes them look a little underused. That small detail is what made this good problem to be a little short of a Prize.
