
The general standard of the field was lower than expected from such a major event; however the eventual award displays a fine selection that would hopefully appeal to the general chess community.

I received 56 entries on anonymous diagrams. I had to exclude one of the final 20 candidates **D12** (♔h1/♔a6) due to a cook: 3. ♖:e4 ♕:c6 (3...b2 4. ♕d5 b1♖ 5. ♖:e2 ♔b6 6. ♖e8) 4. ♕d5 ♕:d5 5. c:d5 b2 6. ♖:e2 b1♖ 7. ♖e6+ = Tablebase.

The following candidates had significant anticipations: **D9** (♔b4/♔h5) **D22** (♔h1/♖b5), **D27** (♔c1/♖g3), **D46** (♔h1/♖g4), **D54** (♔d1/♖c6).

Early piece exchanges result in a highly original pawn ending which after move 5 splits to sixth(!) different variations each ending up in a queen promotion followed by a different skewer on a different diagonal! Quite an achievement however personally I would prefer to skip those early exchanges on their extra load of side play and start the solution on move 4 in a pure pawn ending.
